**Abstract:** This course will examine recent debates regarding race correction in medicine from the standpoints of ethics, law, and policy. Dr. Callier will present empirical evidence on how doctors respond to race-based drug guidelines and describe how lack of diversity, equity, and inclusion in genomics research lead to health inequities.
